The Outdoor Circle Completes “Lei of Aloha”

On November 20, 2004, Outdoor Circle members, volunteers and community partners gathered at ‘Aina Moana, better known as Magic Island, for a tree planting and public education event. More than 150 people came together on this beautiful morning not only to plant 35 trees and coconut palms, but also to complete Christine Snyder’s vision of planting trees and palms around the entire perimeter of Magic Island. She called it a “Lei of Aloha.”

The morning began with **Kumu Hula Kula Abiva** chanting a welcome for the group and **Halau Na Ki Pu‘upu‘u**

performing traditional hula honoring the tree planting legacies of Queen Lili‘uokalani and Princess Ka‘iulani. We then broke into smaller groups, each led by a certified arborist, to plant new trees and to mulch all remaining trees on Magic Island. A display describing the harmful effects of placing hot BBQ coals at the base of the trees also was prominently exhibited at the Welcome Tent.

A big mahalo goes to the City & County of Honolulu’s Division of Urban Forestry. Without the support of Administrator **Stan Oka** and his extremely dedicated crew of urban forestry professionals, this very special day would not have happened. We also would like to thank the numerous certified arborists and tree planting volunteers who helped make this day so memorable!

The Outdoor Circle and our twelve branches across the state would like to thank you, our members and supporters, for helping us keep Hawai'i "clean, green and beautiful." Working with you, The Outdoor Circle:

- ♻️ Scored a major victory when Federal District Court Judge David Ezra upheld the current ban on aerial advertising over O'ahu;
- ♻️ Joined forces with Outdoor Circle members to halt advertising on the outside of TheBus;
- ♻️ Passed legislation to encourage the preservation of majestic trees across the state;
- ♻️ Completed Christine Snyder's vision of a "lei of aloha" at 'Aina Moana Park;
- ♻️ Celebrated Arbor Day by planting a Monkeypod in honor of Mayor Jeremy Harris;
- ♻️ Partnered with the Army and Navy to increase tree preservation and open space in housing privatization projects;
- ♻️ Partnered with the Department of Education resulting in proper tree maintenance and evaluation;
- ♻️ Received the National Arbor Day Award for our efforts in planting, preserving and protecting Hawaii's trees;
- ♻️ CEO Mary Steiner was recognized as an "Unsung Hero" by Hawaii's Thousand Friends;
- ♻️ Highlighted the organization's history with an exhibit called "Digging into the Outdoor Circle," which opened at The Bridge Gallery at the University of Hawai'i at Manoa;
- ♻️ Raised significant monies at the Trick or Trees Fundraiser for the Save Our Skies campaign to keep aerial advertising out of Hawai'i;
- ♻️ Formed new Outdoor Circle branches, further extending our reach across the state, and
- ♻️ Embarked on a comprehensive fundraising program to ensure our financial stability in perpetuity.

Additionally, some significant accomplishments of The Outdoor Circle's energetic and project-driven branches are noted below:

Kona Outdoor Circle (Hawai'i):

The Kona Outdoor Circle (KOC) was instrumental in making the opening day festivities at the new Kona recycling center a

success, providing hot lunches and educating residents about the importance of recycling. KOC also is co-sponsoring Malama 'Aina Day in partnership with the Kona-Kohala Chamber of Commerce, playing an important role in the event by supplying bags and gloves and providing rubbish collection at the completion of the day's events.

Lani-Kailua Outdoor Circle (O'ahu):

Throughout 2004, The Lani-Kailua Outdoor Circle (LKOC) has partnered with the Windward Community Correctional Center (WCCC) to clear areas and plant native species at the Ulupo Heiau. The annual I Love Kailua Town Party was a smashing success as well as LKOC's Holiday House Tour. Work also started on designing and implementing a new garden for the interior court of the Kailua Library as well as a memorial garden for Dot Wright at Pohakupu Fountain.

Maui Outdoor Circle:

The Maui Outdoor Circle (MOC) held their Annual Picnic at Rainbow Park in Makawao to celebrate the preservation of the shower trees lining Baldwin Avenue, which were scheduled for destruction due to the creation of a bike path along this route. MOC President Warren McCord and dedicated volunteers are still deeply involved with finding solutions to the conflicts associated with the proposed Baldwin Avenue Bicycle Path.

North Kohala Outdoor Circle (Hawai'i):

2004 was a great start up year for the North Kohala Outdoor Circle (NKOC). Neglected wiliwili and koia trees along Coast Guard Road and plumeria trees by the school in town received some kokua from enthusiastic volunteers. The NKOC Pololu Valley clean-up was a smashing success. With the help of more than 50 volunteers, one helicopter, and ten strong mules, tons of rubbish from the Pololu Valley floor were

removed. NKOC also made a strong showing at the 20th Annual Kohala Country Fair, distributing brochures and educating the public regarding the goals of The Outdoor Circle.

North Shore Outdoor Circle (O'ahu):

The North Shore Outdoor Circle (NSOC) continues to maintain Weed Circle by coordinating monthly maintenance by local civic groups and NSOC members. The bike path maintenance is as successful as ever, with the very popular Harvest Ball funding the project. Another fundraiser called Appetites of Asia, which was held at Dillingham Ranch, and also the annual plant sale at Waimea Audubon were important educational and fundraising efforts to maintain the many projects NSOC undertakes each year.

Waikoloa Village Outdoor Circle (Hawai'i):

The Waikoloa Village Outdoor Circle (WVOC) is in the planning phase of developing a long-term commitment with the Kona Land Trust and the Village Board to protect wiliwili trees and endangered uhiuhi trees in a conservation area outside of the village limits. The WVOC is formulating long-term goals, which include the development of a dry-land demonstration forest.

Wai'alaie-Kahala Outdoor Circle (O'ahu):

The Wai'alaie-Kahala Outdoor Circle (WKOC) worked with the management of the Hawaii Kai Shopping Center to transplant a mature tree which otherwise would have been destroyed due to construction in the parking lot. The

WKOC also has been collecting photos of unsightly vacant lots to report them to the building department to improve the aesthetic quality of the Wai'alaie-Kahala area. In addition, the WKOC is planning to provide more hot coal receptacles in area parks.

Waimea Outdoor Circle (Hawai'i):

The Waimea Outdoor Circle (WOC) was as active as ever in 2004, hosting various events from the 13th annual plant sale in conjunction with the Cherry Blossom Festival to the ever-popular Makahiki o Waimea. WOC volunteers continued to make improvements to the Waimea Nature Park, including planting the area behind the greenhouse. Additionally, more than 200 people attended the WOC's planting of an ohia tree at the Waimea Nature Park in memory of Jo Diotalevi, a founding member of Recycle Hawai'i and a board member of WOC.

Wai Momi Outdoor Circle (O'ahu):

Throughout the year, the Wai Momi Outdoor Circle (WMOC) hosted litter collections at the Keaiwa Heiau, the Halawa Heiau and Rainbow Bay Park in Aiea. The WMOC also worked to clear mangroves along the Pearl Harbor Historic Trail and planted green ti at the Keaiwa Heiau. This active branch started a newsletter called Wai Momi Nuhou, which is published every other month. The WMOC also is working to landscape the Aiea Post Office and is planning a membership drive this year.

Outdoor Circle Pushes to End Aerial Advertising Statewide

2004 brought a resounding victory in our effort to end the scourge of aerial advertising in our beautiful islands. Judge David Ezra upheld the City and County of Honolulu's ban on aerial advertising which had been challenged by the Center for Bioethical Reform (CBR). But the war to keep Hawaii's skies free of visual pollution is not over. CBR has appealed the ruling to the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals, and also has threatened additional action in State court.

The Outdoor Circle believes that the only way to permanently protect our skies is by broadening the law that prohibits billboards in Hawai'i. To that end, we introduced House Bill 864 and Senate Bill 1060 into the 2005 legislature. These bills, when passed, amend the State billboard law so that it will read: "...unless a county ordinance specifies otherwise, the prohibition shall extend to billboards or outdoor advertising devices located in the airspace or waters beyond the boundaries of the county where visible from any public highway, park, or other public place located in the county."

Both bills are moving successfully through the legislative process. If approved, the change will close a loop-hole in the state billboard law by allowing counties to create ordinances banning aerial advertising. That should thwart future efforts by CBR or others to foul our skies with ugly visual clutter. Now is the time for all of us to stand up for one of the things that truly separates Hawai'i from the rest of the country—the total absence of billboards and similar inappropriate advertising.

Change in Tax Law Affects Vehicle Donations

Due to legislation passed by Congress last October, and effective January 1, 2005, those who donate vehicles to a charity will no longer be able to deduct the *Blue Book* value of the vehicle from their taxes. Instead, donors only may write off the amount for which the vehicle is sold. The Outdoor Circle continues to accept vehicle donations and will inform donors about the amount of their donation. Despite the change in tax law, this form of charitable giving continues to be a win-win for both the donor and The Outdoor Circle.
