Foster Garden traces its beginning to 1853 when Queen Kalama leased a portion of her land to German physician and botanist Dr. William Hillebrand. In 1884, Mary Mikahala Robinson Foster purchased the property, nurturing and expanding Hillebrand's plant collections. Upon her death in 1930, she donated the estate to the City and County of Honolulu to be preserved for public enjoyment. Foster Garden is home to 23 Exceptional Trees and special interest gardens including the Prehistoric Glen, Butterfly Garden, Economic Garden, and the Orchid Conservatory.


