
















Endangered Oahu Tree Snail

Cell Tower near

Bonzai Pipeline Skate Park

Negotiations continue, but it looks like a resolution between the provider and a land owner is imminent for the placement of a new cell tower on the north shore. It will be tucked among iron woods, between the access road to the skate park and Pukea Road. The owners of these lots would have had an in- your-face view of the tower between their homes and the skate park. The latest proposed site will place the tower well to the Haleiwa side of the skate park access road and away from Sunset Beach Elementary School and the Land Trust. Pukea home owners have been queried and appear to be okay with the proposed site.

Plumeria Pruning

Workshop

On Saturday morning, April 7, 2018 several NSOC members gathered with tools in hand at Weed Circle where we were treated to a plumeria pruning

workshop given by NSOC member, arborist and orchid "Guru" Doug Demoss. A big mahalo to Doug for sharing some great information, demonstrating how it can be done and letting us give it a try. There were

lots of questions answered and we all felt happy with how the tree trees looked when we finished. It was nice to talk story with friends as we worked.

The idea for this session was to clear out the dead wood, and lift the trees a bit so State Workers can mow and weed whack under the trees. Once the trees recover from this pruning we'll go back and take the height down just a bit so that the overall shape of the trees will be suited for showing the flowers off but they'll remain at a picking height. Only one tree was in distress and we talked about removing it and replanting another variety of plumeria. We hope to continue with a few more pruning days this year at the circle, working on the Kou trees and Kukui. Hope you'll join us sometime.

Report from the Signs Committee

The Signs Committee met on Friday March 16 at Kahuku Farms Café. We were delighted that Winston Welch and Jackie Wah of The Outdoor Circle statewide office joined us. After enjoying a lunch of farm fresh food, we talked about concrete steps we can take to reduce sign clutter on the North Shore.

Reporting sign violations: Whenever we see violations of the sign code of the City and County of Honolulu, we need to report them to the Department of Planning and Permitting (768-8152). But, signs in the right-of-way of state highways (such as Kamehameha Hwy) need to be reported to the State Department of Transportation (831-6714).

There are two more big issues going on at Honolulu Hale that can help control sign clutter in our area:

The County is doing a complete review of the Land Use Ordinance including the <u>sign code</u>. They
have asked The Outdoor Circle to suggest improvements to the sign code. Our next sign
committee meeting will address this opportunity. Those attending the meeting received copies of
the sign code for review and suggestions.



2.A proposed new ordinance to regulate <u>food trucks</u> throughout the island is making its way through the Planning Commission and City Council. An additional ordinance will amend the Haleiwa Special District to designate where food trucks can operate within Haleiwa. These ordinances can help preserve the visual environment and they need our feedback and support.

As co-presidents we hope to see our members as well as interested citizens at the **General Membership Meeting, Monday, April 23, 2018**, at **6:00 pm** at the **Waialua Court House** in **Haleiwa**.

It has been a busy and fruitful six months since the last general membership meeting for the North Shore Outdoor Circle (NSOC). Members attended a wonderful holiday celebration at the Peerson home in Pupukea and participated in learning how to prune plumeria trees, do volunteer work in Weed Circle in Haleiwa and atop Mt. Kaala as well as created the floral centerpieces for the North Shore Chamber of Commerce Dinner in Waimea Valley.

Concerns over view planes kept members involved in attending meetings on the cell phone tower originally slated for construction behind Sunset Beach Elementary School, and the elimination of trees and plant life fronting the collapsing Sunset Beach bike path. The maintenance of trees on the rest of the Sunset bike path, the maintenance of the view of Waimea Bay and the building of a strip mall fronting Loko Ea Fishpond all sparked the interest and involvement of NSOC members.

Sandwich signs and other illegal signs advertising wares or services continued to pop up across the landscape and attracted members who still work hard to ensure that signage laws are enforced and that people are educated regarding what is legal.

Board members addressed the NSOC stance on double telephone poles as well as polystyrene containers and attended city council meetings to support or oppose various resolutions.

As co-presidents, we conducted bi-monthly board meetings and with other board members, attended a variety of community meetings where issues that were central to the NSOC mission were brought up for discussion or resolution. We both agree that the mission of the NSOC is the only pivot on which members plan and go forward - addressing what steps need to be taken.

We encourage you to read about events and other NSOC news in the NSOC newsletter. We also agree that there needs to be a substantial and sustained campaign to increase general membership and bring more young people into the fold of the oldest environmental organization in Hawaii.
